Extracts from the Will of William West (II) of Firbeck



xtx

(William West was born in 1571, the son of William West of Rotherham and grandson of John West of Aughton. He attended Emmanuel College, Cambridge and matriculated in 1586. In 1590 he was living at Moorgate, Rotherham and played an important part in the running of the town. That year he published a book called Symboleography", a practical guide to English law. He was

seneschal (steward) to George the 5th Earl of Shrewsbury and chief steward of the manor of Sheffield when Mary Queen of Scots was a prisoner at Sheffield Castle. He made a fortune as a lawyer and purchased land at Firbeck where he built a house, now known as Firbeck Hall. He died in Aston Hall, the home of his daughter Elizabeth, on the 24th May 1646 and was buried at Firbeck. Elizabeth had married John Lord Darcy of Aston and after his death, Sir Francis Fane. William West's son John (died 7th June 1659), left Firbeck to his nephew, Sir Francis Fane, son of the Sir Francis mentioned in this will.)

August 8th 1646. I William West of Firbecke in the County of York, Esq. now remaining at Aston with my dearest and only relict daughter the Ladie Darcie, the now wife of Sir Francis Fane of the honorable order of the Bathe, Knight, aged and infirm in body. My body to be buried in ffirbecke church where my dear Parents and five children were long since buried, and now of late my most dearly beloved wife deceased with them interred.

And as touching my personal estate, which God in his goodness hath suffered me to enjoy, though it be but small yet I hope sufficient to content me whilst I live here in this world, consisting of these particulars. The capital messuage of Thwaite and all the houses, lands, and tenements, and the yearly rent charge or annuity of £30 of yearly rent issuing out of my son's lands in ffirbeck, Maltby, Letwell, and Gildingwell in the county of York, and in the parish of Blithe in the county of Nottingham.

First, I give and bequeath unto Sir Francis Fane of the honorable order of the Bathe and his lady and every one of their children, my grandchildren, 20s. a piece in gold, and to Elizabeth Savile, my grandchild, also a 20s. piece of gold. I give to my son John West the ring that was my father and mother's wedding ring, which hath a Greek posie. To my said son John West according to his mother's desire, her and my wedding ring, and two other rings given to myself and wife by my cousin Catherine West, with the engraved posie Vivo memor Lethi (live ever mindful of death).

I give unto the said Sir Francis Fane all my Booke of Statutes sett out severally and particularly as they were sett out at large at their first impression, and all discourses and abridgments concerning a Justice of Peace his office and employment.

I give to my said daughter the lady Darcie, now Sir Francis Fane's wife, all my goods and chattels whatsoever, and do make her my full and sole executor. And whereas my said daughter of her free good will engaged herself to pay unto two of my sisters Mrs. Margaret Freschevile, widow, and Edith the wife of Godfrey Columbell, gent., £5 a piece yearly at the feast days of Whitsuntide and Martinmas by equal portions, which by reason of the hardness of these times (her goods and lands being sequestrated) she hath been unable to pay for some years past, but had an intention to perform it always when she was able, therefore I give unto my said daughter that £250 which Mrs. Francis Westby, widow, her son George, and Mr. Anthony Hadfield was bounden to pay unto me, the better to enable her out of the consideration or interest of the said £150 to discharge that £4 and 10s. a piece yearly, to pay my said sisters during their lives.

And if my said sister shall die during my said daughter's life, I mean if both my said sisters shall die, my said daughter living, then the said £4 and 10s. a piece shall utterly cease, but if one of them shall survive my said daughter, that £4 and 10s. only shall be paid to my surviving sister during her natural life, and the said £150 shall be entirely to the use, behoof, and wholely disposed of by my said daughter, my executor, at her pleasure.

Codicil, March 7, 1646. I do further add unto my above written will and testament that it is my will and desire that my burial at ffirbeck may be performed without any solemnity, save only a refreshment to be given at my son's house at ffirbeck unto such persons as shall be present at my burial.

And I do give and bequeath to every one of my nieces, the daughters of my brothers and sisters, 20s. a piece in gold. And I do give and bequeath unto the poor of the town of Rotherham, to which I have ever born good will, 50s., to be disposed of according to the discretion of Richard Mountenay, esq. and William Stainford, of Rotherham, my approved friends. And I give and bequeath to the poor of Aston 25s., to be disposed of by my ancient servant John Shore. And also other 25s. to the poor of ffirbeck, to be distributed by my son John West.

And also it is my will that if Mr. ffletcher thinks convenient to preach a sermon at my burial, and shall take the pains to do it himself, he shall have 20s. for his pains. Also I give and bequeath to my brother Thomas West my black plush cloak and the best of my woollen clothes. All the rest of my clothes I give to my servant John Shore.

(Will and codicil proved May 7, 1651, by Lady Elizabeth Darcy alias West, daughter.)

1 MAY : MAY DAY - Unbridled Merriment

May is the month when the ancient pagans used to get up to 'all sorts'! The Romans held their festival to honour the mother-goddess Maia, goddess of nature and growth. (May is named after her.) The early Celts celebrated the feast of Beltane, in honour of the sun god, Beli.

For centuries in 'Olde England' the people went mad in May. After the hardship of winter, and hunger of early Spring, May was a time of indulgence and unbridled merriment. One Philip Stubbes, writing in 1583, was scandalised: 'for what kissing and bussing, what smooching and slabbering one of another, is not practised?'

Henry VIII went 'maying' on many occasions. Then folk would stay out all night in the dark rain-warm thickets and return in the morning for dancing on the green around the May pole, archery, vaulting, wrestling, and evening bonfires.

The Protestant reformers took a strong stand against May Day, and in 1644 May Day was abolished altogether. Many May poles came down – only to go up again at the Restoration, when the first May Day of King Charles's reign was 'the happiest Mayday that hath been many a year in England', according to Pepys.

May Day to most people today brings vague folk memories of a young Queen of the May decorated with garlands and streamers and flowers, a May Pole to weave, Morris dancing, and the intricacies of well dressing at Tissington in Derbyshire.

May Day is a medley of natural themes such as sunrise, the advent of summer, growth in nature, and – since 1833 – Robert Owen's vision of a millennium in the future, beginning on May Day, when there would be no more poverty, injustice or cruelty, but harmony and friendship. This is why, in modern times, May Day has become Labour Day, which honours the dignity of workers. And until recently, in communist countries May Day processions were in honour of the achievement of Marxism.

There has never been a Christian content to May Day, but nevertheless there is the well-known 6am service on the top of Magdalen Tower at Oxford where a choir sings in the dawn of May Day.

An old May carol includes the lines:

The life of man is but a span, it flourishes like a flower We are here today and gone tomorrow – we are dead within an hour.

There is something of a sadness about it, both in words and tune, as there is about all purely sensuous joy. For May Day is not Easter, and the joys it represents have always been earth-bound and fleeting.

22 MAY : ROGATION SUNDAY - The Sunday before Ascension

Rogation means an asking of God – for blessing on the seed and land for the year ahead. It is appropriate in any emergency, war, plague, drought or foul weather. The practice began with the Romans, who invoked the help of the gods Terminus and Ambarvalia. In those days a crowd moved in procession around the cornfields, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals, and driving away Winter with sticks. They wanted to rid the cornfields of evil.



In about 465 the Western world was suffering from earthquake, storm and epidemic. So Mamertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the popular pagan custom, ordered that prayers should be said in the ruined or neglected fields on the days leading up to Ascension. With his decision, 'beating the bounds' became a Christian ceremonial.

Rogation-tide arrived in England early in the eighth century and became a fixed and perennial asking for help of the Christian God. On Rogation-tide, a little party would set out to trace the boundaries of the parish. At the

head marched the bishop or the priest, with a minor official bearing a Cross, and after them the people of the parish, with schoolboys and their master trailing along. Most of them held slender wands of willow.

At certain points along the route – at well-known landmarks like a bridge or stile or ancient tree, the Cross halted, the party gathered about the priest, and a litany or rogation is said, imploring God to send seasonable wealth, keep the corn and roots and boughs in good health, and bring them to an ample harvest. At some point beer and cheese would be waiting.

In the days when maps were neither common nor accurate, there was much to be said for 'beating the bounds.' It was still very common as late as the reign of Queen Victoria. Certainly, parish boundaries rarely came into dispute, for everyone knew them. (Do you know yours today?)

Jubilees past and present.

The first Jubilee I remember was the Queen's Silver Jubilee of 1977. I recall the excitement of seeing the Queen at a packed Elland Road in July 1977 together with thousands of other flag waving, cheering eleven year olds bussed in for the occasion. I can even remember what we had for school dinner upon return that afternoon. It was ham with grated carrot, shredded raw cabbage mixed with raisins and sliced beetroot – masquerading as a salad. Raisins were considered the apex of healthy eating and invaded many meals – including Vesta's infamous dried curry mix. I remember the salad as we were all so hungry when we got back to school that we would have eaten anything (apart from tripe).

The other thing I remember is getting a mug with a wonky transfer image of HRH on it. But I also inherited a cracked, ancient looking, Diamond Jubilee Mug from great auntie Maggie. She had also been eleven when she got hers in 1897.

Jubilees have been celebrated for hundreds of years. Importantly they can help lift the spirits. For example, the 1977 Jubilee took place during growing industrial unrest and it did help bring communities together. In 1977 there was the first ever fireman's strike. You could see the army's 'Green Goddess' fire engines on the street. Inflation was 'just' 16% - a big fall from the 25% of 1975. But public sector pay increases were capped way below this. Sharp increases in the cost of living have often put people under pressure. We have been fortunate, until recently, not to have experienced severe inflation since the early 1990s.

Queen Elizabeth is celebrating her Platinum Jubilee this year as the first monarch to reach the seventieth anniversary of her Accession to the throne. She was unexpectedly catapulted into the role at only age 25. Her father George VI died, whilst she was on holiday in Kenya with Prince Philip, on 6th February 1952. The Accession should not be confused with the Coronation which took place more than a year later on 2nd June 1953. You don't need to be a monarchist to enjoy a good event. We will be theming some of our Rotherham Friendship Lunches in June with the Jubilee and hope lots of older people will attend at the various venues. But I am sure there will be plenty going on, especially over the extended double Bank Holiday of Thursday June 2nd to Sunday 5th.

Before the Queen's Golden Jubilee in 2002 some commentators suggested that it would be a flop as few street parties had been arranged by spring. In the end however, there were lots and festivities culminated on 4th June in London with over a million people attending a parade and flypast. But whatever happens if you buy a commemorative mug ensure you get one without a wonky picture. They last forever... Let's help make it a happy time across Rotherham for everyone, whatever other troubles there might be. Get planning now!
