The Rectory St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren



This has been an unusual month: we have moved from hysterical excitement to deep disappointment within the space of days.

For many years, our vestry has displayed an oil painting generously donated by the Dowager Duchess of Stansby – given to us, I suspect, because her son, the tenth Duke, would not allow it in his house. It was supposed to depict Daniel in the lions' den, although I always thought it looked more like a prospective adopter visiting a dog rescue centre. The Dowager was less than pleased when it wasn't made the centrepiece in the sanctuary, but we managed to persuade her that her exceptional work of art would be safer from theft if locked away.

Then – our cleaner happened to knock it off the wall. If it had landed in her bucket of disinfectant and been totally destroyed, it would have been a sadness I suspect I could have learned to bear. But something more interesting happened. Some of the Dowager's oil was chipped off – to reveal a painting underneath of what looked like a cherub.

The cleaner told the churchwarden, who instructed her not to tell anyone about the find. This inevitably meant that, within the hour, the entire parish knew of the discovery of what had already been transformed into a priceless pre-Raphaelite treasure. Our churchwarden has yet to learn the fact that if you tell someone something in complete confidence, they assume it means they can only tell one other person at a time.

By evening, mutually opposed camps had already formed. Miss Timmins wanted the treasure to be placed in a side chapel, as a shrine, preferably with candles permanently burning beside it. Edith Clara Spray, a Suffragette from Aston



Edith Clara Spray was born in 1871 in Netherthorpe, Aston, the daughter and only child of John and Mary Spray. John was my great grandmother's brother, so Edith was my cousin (somewhat removed).

Edith moved to Pitt Street, Kimberworth where she was a boarder with John and Florence Lewis and was training as a milliner/dressmaker. In 1893 she married Edward Whitworth. He was a Postal Telegraphist and they lived at 70 Wath Road, Ecclesall, Sheffield. They had a son Alan and a daughter Marjorie Mary.

In the 1911 census they had moved to 120 Heeley Bank Road, Sheffield. Their son Alan had followed in his mother's footsteps as a tailor (cutter). Marjorie was still at school but later followed her father as a Post Office Telegraphist. n 1917, Marjorie joined the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps as a Telegraphist.

Edward died in 1924 and in the 1939 register Edith and Marjorie are living at 21 Bowness Avenue, Oxford and Marjorie is still working as a Post Office Telegraphist. Edith died on the 22nd February 1964 aged 92 in Cowley Road Hospital, Oxford. Marjorie died on 23rd April 1974 aged 88. They are buried together in Headington Cemetery, Oxford.

Suffragettes

The struggle by British women for suffrage began in the mid-19th century and the first women's suffrage society run by women for women began in Sheffield: the Sheffield Women's Political Association. The inaugural meeting was held on 26th February 1851 at the Democratic Temperance Hotel on Queen Street.

They described the food as terrible. The first meal of the day was a brown "cob" of bread and a pint mug of abominable tea, usually with a piece of fat bacon which they could not eat. In the middle of the day they were given some sort of meat, usually corned beef and three or four potatoes boiled in their jackets. Supper was cocoa and a dry "cob". They had to sleep on very uncomfortable plank beds covered with a thin mattress.

Edith Clara Whitworth became involved in the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU) which was run by the Pankhursts and became the secretary of the group. The above photograph of her appeared in the Sheffield Telegraph on Thursday 14th February 1907 and they reported "Mrs. Edith Whitworth, who was one of the suffragettes arrested in the disturbance outside the house of Commons last night, is one of the most enthusiastic disciples of the Women's Social and Political Union in Sheffield. She was one of the ladies on the platform at the Cemetery Road Vestry Hall on Sunday, February 3rd 1907, when Mrs. Pankhurst delivered a lecture on Women's Suffrage, and on that occasion she was the mover of a resolution demanding immediate legislation extending the franchise to women."

She took part in a march in London and was arrested outside the House of Commons and along with Mrs. Yates from Sheffield, appeared in Court and they were both sentenced to either a 20 shilling fine or 14 days imprisonment. They chose the latter and spent the time in Holloway Prison.

When she was released and returned to Sheffield she was interviewed by the Sheffield Telegraph. Asked what she thought of prison life, Edith remarked "If you are not a rebel before going into Holloway, there is no reason to wonder at your being one when you come out. The authorities were very severe and they did it to deter us from going again, but it certainly will not. For we are true daughters of the old Chartists, and mean to fight." They were taken out each morning for an hour's exercise when they had to walk very quickly round and round the exercise yard. Mrs. Whitworth said it was too strenuous for her as she was becoming weaker each day through lack of food and thought that if she had to stay another week her health would have given way.

Edith moved to less radical forms of protest. She joined the Women's Freedom League in 1907 along with many other defectors from the WSPU. The WFL was formed by Charlotte Despard after a dispute with the Pankhursts. This league used more "constitutional" forms of protests and focussed on changing public opinion without breaking the law, such as avoiding the 1911 census. You were not counted if you were not at home so some camped on the moors to avoid it. Edith did not, she is on the census with her family. She later moved to Oxford and I can find no reference to her as a suffragette in the local Oxford newspapers.

5th June - Day of Pentecost, Whit Sunday

Pentecost took place on the well-established Jewish festival of Firstfruits, which was observed at the beginning of the wheat harvest. It was seven weeks after Easter, or 50 days including Easter.

A feast day to celebrate the country's wheat harvest does not sound exactly worldchanging, but that year, it became one of the most important days in world history. For Pentecost was the day that Jesus sent the Holy Spirit – the day the Church was born.

Jesus had told His disciples that something big was going to happen, and that they were to wait for it in Jerusalem, instead of returning to Galilee. Jesus had plans for His disciples, but He knew they could not do the work themselves. They would need His help.

And so, they waited in Jerusalem, praying together with His other followers, for many days. And then on that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues, to the astonishment of those who heard them. The curse of Babel (Genesis 11: 1- 9) was dramatically reversed that morning.

That morning the Holy Spirit came to indwell the disciples and followers of Jesus. The Church was born. The Christians were suddenly full of life and power, utterly different from their former fearful selves. The change in them was permanent.

Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian Church that morning, proclaiming Jesus was the Messiah. His boldness in the face of possible death was in marked contrast to the man who had denied Jesus 50 days before. And 3,000 people responded, were converted, and were baptised. How's that for fast church growth!

Of course, Pentecost was not the first time the Holy Spirit had acted in this world. All through the Old Testament there are accounts of how God's Spirit guided people and strengthened them. But now, because of Christ's death and resurrection, He could INDWELL them. From now on, every Christian could have the confidence

22nd June - St Alban, Britain's first Christian martyr

Alban was the very first Christian martyr in Britain – or at least the first we know of. A 'martyr' is someone who has died for the faith – the word literally means 'witness'. He was probably killed during the persecution under the emperor Diocletian in the early years of the fourth century, in the late stages of the Roman occupation of Britain. His martyrdom took place in the amphitheatre outside the Roman city of Verulamium, which is now St Albans, in Hertfordshire.

The church historian Bede, writing six hundred years after Alban's death, records that Alban was a Roman citizen (possibly a soldier) who gave shelter to a priest who was being hunted by the Romans. During the priest's stay in his home, Alban was converted to the Christian faith. When the soldiers eventually tracked the priest down, they arrived at Alban's house and insisted on searching it.



What they found was Alban dressed in the priest's clothes, while their real prey escaped. They arrested Alban and demanded that he make a sacrifice to the Emperor – a common test of loyalty. He refused. He was then condemned to death and taken into the amphitheatre, which still stands in the fields below St Alban's Abbey, to be put to death. One of his executioners was converted, Bede claims, but the other one took a sword and beheaded him.

He was buried nearby, on a site where a shrine was later erected. In the early fifth century two Continental bishops, Germanus of Auxerre and Lupus of Troyes, were sent to Britain and record that they visited the shrine of Alban at Verulamium. The date of their visit was given as 429.

The martyrdom of Alban is a reminder that Christianity was planted first in these islands during the Roman occupation, though it was all but extinguished in England in the dark centuries that followed, until people like David, Cuthbert and the other Celtic missionaries restored the faith in many parts of the land – especially in the north. The fact that his shrine existed and was venerated right through to the time of Bede also demonstrates that the faith did not die out completely, even in the south of England.

Not a great deal is known about Alban apart from the story of his martyrdom, but what we do know is probably enough to give him a substantial claim to be the patron saint of England ahead of the foreigner St George.

Roche Abbey

Trips out and walks associated with ruined abbeys have been popular for hundreds of years. The ruins are the remains of the many monastic communities dissolved by King Henry VIII. Roche Abbey is close by. It is set in a valley, Maltby Beck, landscaped by 'Capability' Brown. Its transepts, the arms of the cross shape coming off the main church area or nave, are still at their original height. Excavated foundations complete the impression of its once great size.

Roche was founded in 1147 by the Cistercian Order of monks, a branch of the Benedictines. They were famously called White Monks on account of the colour of the habits they wore. The Cistercians came to Rotherham from Newminster Abbey in Northumberland, which is now unfortunately inaccessible to visitors. Originally the land had been under the control of Richard FitzTurgis, Lord of Wickersley. Back then it was at the edge of Sherwood Forrest. Once built the Church was dedicated to the Virgin Mary. Some 60 Choir monks and 115 lay brothers made Roche Abbey a bustling place of prayer and day to day activities at its peak.

Roche Abbey was suppressed in 1538 by which time only 14 monks remained to be pensioned off. Originally the dissolution of the monasteries was part of a more modest plan to reduce the number of smaller religious houses, such as Roche Abbey. It was part of a general Church reform process which, amongst other things, was also intended to establish more colleges for monks than monasteries. But the protestant reformation was also well underway and Henry's well known marriage politics played a huge part. Most local Abbots never saw it coming.

By 1539 the King of France and the Holy Roman Emperor had ended their longstanding mutual hostilities. Henry VIII now felt England and his crown were exposed to a French invasion. As a result, he needed to raise money, lots of money, to build great defences along the South coast from St Michael's Mount in Cornwall to Lowestoft in Norfolk. That is some 650 miles, a truly enormous project. The small-scale dissolution became almost total as Abbeys were dissolved with their property sold off by the King to raise money.

Michael Sherbrook, the rector of Wickersley, watched as: '...the church was the first thing that was spoiled; then the abbot's lodging, the dormitory and refectory, with the cloister and all the buildings around, within the abbey walls...' He added: 'It would have pitied any heart to see the tearing up of the lead, the plucking up of boards and throwing down of the rafters. And when the lead was torn off and cast down into the church and the tombs in the church were all broken... and all things of value were spoiled, plucked away or utterly defaced, those who cast the lead into fodders plucked up all the seats in the choir where the monks sat when they said service...' It was a sad end but it provided a local legacy we can all still visit today.
