My dear Nephew Darren,



Your offer to bring in your team of church members, in order to make a house call on every home in our parish, was most generous. I do understand why you would need us to accommodate your team of 25 visitors, and then hold a residential training weekend for our own members of the team. I accept that we would have to produce a visiting pack listing all our church organisations, giving contact names and numbers and a short resume of what each group did, along with our mission statement and safeguarding policy. I also understand your suggestion that we include a supplement outlining our stewardship scheme.

Your plan that we should then hold an opening Service to which all the newcomers would be invited, and to which we might fly in a world-renowned speaker for the occasion, is understandable. And then of course we would need your help us to set up a finance committee with budgets and organised fund raising. But what you seem to have missed is that our entire parish consists of something like 70 homes. They would not feel visited, but invaded.

Instead, I feel it would be best if we attempt something a little more low-key: an invitation to sherry after Mattins, perhaps, where we could find out which of them plays golf and who may like to join the Bridge Club. Gradually, as the sherry flowed, we would also seek to discover who would be prepared to go on the brass cleaning, flower arranging and grass cutting rotas, which are the traditionally recognised signs of committed Christians, at least in this parish.

Inevitably, this means that none of our church members will be joining your team as you visit the residents of the new tower block in your parish. Most of our congregation abandoned attempting stairs some years ago and their polite enquiries about which Hunt the residents belong to, and where they stable their horses may lead to a rather stilted conversation.

You are, of course, all prepared to welcome your new residents with enthusiasm, excitement, and frenetic activity; our policy of polite indifference and brief conversations about the weather should soon help ours to settle in in no time.

6th August - The Transfiguration : A Glimpse of Glory

The story is told in Matthew (17:1-9), Mark (9:1-9) and Luke (9:28-36).

It was a time when Jesus' ministry was popular, when people were seeking Him out. But on this day, He made time to take Peter, James and John, His closest disciples, up a high mountain. In the fourth century, Cyrillic of Jerusalem identified it as Mount Tabor (and there is a great church up there today), but others believe it more likely to have been one of the three spurs of Mount Hermon, which rises to about 9,000 feet, and overlooks Caesarea Philippi.

High up on the mountain, Jesus was suddenly transfigured before His friends. His face began to shine as the sun, His garments became white and dazzling. Elijah and Moses, of all people, suddenly appeared, and talked with Him. A bright cloud overshadowed the disciples.

Peter was staggered, but, enthusiast that he was – immediately suggested building three tabernacles on that holy place, one for Jesus, one for Moses, and one for Elijah. But God's 'tabernacling', God's dwelling with mankind, does not any longer depend upon building a shrine. It depends on the presence of Jesus, instead. And so a cloud covered them, and a Voice spoke out of the cloud, saying that Jesus was His beloved Son, whom the disciple should 'hear'. God's dwelling with mankind depends upon our listening to Jesus.

Then, just as suddenly, it is all over. What did it mean? Why Moses and Elijah? Well, these two men represent the Law and the Prophets of the Old Covenant, or Old Testament. But now they are handing on the baton, if you like: for both the Law and the Prophets found their true and final fulfilment in Jesus, the Messiah.

Why on top of a mountain? In Exodus we read that Moses went up Mount Sinai to receive the sacred covenant from Yahweh in the form of the Ten Commandments. Now Jesus goes up and is told about the 'sealing' of the New Covenant, or New Testament of God with man, which will be accomplished by His coming death in Jerusalem.

That day made a lifelong impact on the disciples. Peter mentions it in his second letter, 2 Peter 1:16 - 19 - invariably the reading for this day.

The Eastern Churches have long held the Transfiguration as a feast as important as Christmas, Epiphany, Ascension and Pentecost. But it took a long time for the West to observe the Transfiguration. The feast starts appearing from the 11th and 12th centuries, and the Prayer Book included it among the calendar dates, but there was no liturgical provision for it until the 19th century.

30th August - John Bunyan the Man who wrote Pilgrim's Progress

After the Bible, John Bunyan's wonderful Christian allegory, the Pilgrim's Progress, is one of the most celebrated and widely-read books in the English language. It has been translated into more than one hundred languages around the world and keeps its place as a Christian classic.

Names of people and places from its pages have been commonplace wherever English is spoken. We need only recall Mr Great-Heart, Mr Valiant-for-Truth, Giant Despair, Madame Bubble, the Slough of Despond, Vanity Fair, the Delectable Mountains, the Hill Difficulty and the Celestial City.

Bunyan was born on 28 November 1628, at Elstow, near Bedford, England, of a poor family. He had little formal education and his father taught him to be a metal worker. His first wife died young. His second wife, Elizabeth, helped him considerably with his blossoming literary career. His conversion was the result of reading the Bible, and the witness of local Christians. From that time the Bible became the great inspiration of his life. He wrote more than fifty books on Christianity. A Baptist by conviction, he had little time for the Established Church.

Bunyan became a popular preacher, but because of his opposition to the Established Church and because he did not have a Church of England preaching licence, he was imprisoned in 1661. It was in prison that he wrote Pilgrim's Progress. It was not only Bunyan's greatest book but was destined to become one of the most popular Christian books in the world.

Pilgrim's Progress is an allegory, using the names of people and places from the Bible to teach spiritual lessons. The vivid and unforgettable imagery in the Pilgrim's Progress covers the whole Christian gospel from sin and condemnation all the way through faith, repentance, grace, justification, sanctification, and perseverance to heaven itself.

Bunyan died on 31st August 1688. His portrayal of the death of Mr Valiant For Truth is Bunyan at his allegorical best. This brave old soldier of Jesus Christ had received his summons to 'go home.'

Calling his friends together he says, 'My sword I give to him who shall succeed me in my pilgrimage ... My marks and scars I carry with me, to be a witness for me, that I have fought His battles, Who will now be my rewarder.' ... So he passed over, and all the trumpets sounded for him on the other side...'

10 Downing Street

Given recent events we have all found ourselves seeing lots more pictures of a certain building with a large black door. 'Number Ten' is closed off to the general public for security. Sometimes, when watching the news, you hear people protesting, or more rarely cheering, from the gate at the end of the street set amidst the imperial grandeur of Whitehall. It has been the official residence of British Prime Ministers since 1735. It is where they entertain State visitors and host official receptions. 287 years of crucial national and international decisions have been made there. An empire was born and dismantled, the first and second world wars were largely directed from there and economic decisions have been taken both there and at the Chancellor of the Exchequer's residence at Number Eleven.

Number 10 is 'a tardis', larger than it looks, due to its integration into a bigger, grander, building behind it. It also incorporates much of 12 Downing Street, via a corridor running right through Number 11. Most Rotherham folk will never visit Number 10 although every Christmas our own family feels closer to it when we (are forced to) watch the sentimental film Love Actually. Hugh Grant, plays Prime Minister 'David' and does his famous dance to the Pointer Sisters 'Jump (for my love)' down the stairs and through its impressive rooms. It was in fact filmed on a set.

Given recent controversies I was not surprised to find that the first building on the site was 'the Axe brewery' established by the 'merrie' monks of Abingdon Abbey. Downing Street is at the edge of where Cardinal Wolsey's vast Whitehall Palace once stood. It was later seized by King Henry VIII and subsequently burnt down in 1698. Sir George Downing gave his name to the new cul-de-sac of badly appointed large terraced houses with poor foundations. Churchill called Number 10 'Shaky and lightly built by the profiteering contractor whose name they bear.' The last known private resident was a 'Mr Chicken' of whom little is known.

King George II presented Number 10 and the grand house behind it to the first PM, Sir Robert Walpole who took up residence in 1735, as First Lord of the Treasury. The brass letterbox on the black front door is still engraved with that title. Walpole's architect William Kent finally got the property up to scratch. Thereafter Prime Ministers *officially* resided at number 10 but, being wealthy, most remained in their own London townhouses. When, the often indebted, Disraeli became Prime Minister in 1868 it had not been used as a home for 30 years and was "dingy and decaying". Nowadays, after generations of updates, it is the ultimate 'home-office'. The Cabinet Room gradually took centre stage but in 1939, the Cabinet itself relocated to secret underground war rooms. These can be visited today https://www.iwm.org.uk/visits/churchill-war-rooms . If passing you might not spot the Prime Minister (*ex* PMs are not so rare) but you just might catch sight of the Number 10 cat....

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ASTON-CUM-AUGHTON FROM LOCAL DIRECTORIES



Looking down Worksop Road in Aston towards the Blue Bell Inn. The entrance to the cemetery is on the right, by the tree.

The directories produced from the early 1800s by Baines, White, the Post Office, Kelly and others are a great source of information for anyone wishing to find out about England's hamlets, villages and towns and their inhabitants and occupations.

The earliest I have is a copy from the 1822 edition of Baines' History and Directory of the West Riding of Yorkshire. Here you can see listed the prominent inhabitants and their occupations.

ASTON, in the Wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill; 5 miles SSE of Rotherham; the church is an elegant building, in the interior of which are marble figures large as life, representing the late Lord Darcey, and his three wives, in the attitude of prayer. Population 556.

Alderson Rev. William, rector & presiding magistrate. Verelst Harry, Esq. Aston Hall Carver William, teacher of free school Craven Samuel, collector of assessed taxes Haywood Thomas, blacksmith Memmot William Shoemaker & parish clerk Roberts Thomas, victualler Bull and Oak Stamforth T. grocer & brandy merchant. Storey William, butcher Tomlins Thomas, joiner Yealand Elizabeth, victualler Yellow Lion.

Farmers: Millns Jonathan: Vicars William: Taylor John: Wood William: Union John.

AUGHTON, in the parish of Aston and Wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill; 4 miles S. of Rotherham Hobson Mary, victualler, Bull Hobson Francis, miller, Steam mill Lister Elizabeth, victualler Robin Hood Inn.

ULLEY (Brampton) in the parishes of Treeton and Aston and Wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill; 4 miles S. of Rotherham. Population 203.

The 1833 White's Directory has an interesting description of Aston-cum-Aughton parish.

ASTON-cum-AUGHTON parish contains 2200 acres of land, and 564 inhabitants. Aston is a good village, seated on an eminence on the Worksop road, 8¹/₄ miles E. by S. of Sheffield. The hall is the seat of Harry Verelst, Esq., the lord of the manor, but was anciently the seat of the Lords Darci, of the last of whom and his three wives there are marble figures as large as life in the church, which has also a handsome stained-glass window. The living is a rectory, of which the Duke of Leeds is patron, and the Rev. Wm. Alderson, B.A. the incumbent.

Several benefactions to the poor and school were laid out in the purchase of 17 acres 19 roods of land in Ecclesfield, now let for £25 a-year, out of which the schoolmaster has £5, together with £2 yearly from the bequest of the Rev. William Mason, in 1797.

AUGHTON hamlet is only about a quarter of a mile from Aston and 1¹/₂ mile to the N.E. is Hardwick, where the Darceys, Earls of Holderness had a seat. At the point where the Rotherham and Mansfield Road crosses the Worksop Road, eight miles from Sheffield, is Swallow Nest, a toll-bar and public-house.

White's Directory of 1838 gives a few more snippets of interesting information about Aston and Aughton, including the fact that the parish seems to have grown as it now includes 2870 acres of land, although the number of inhabitants remains 564.

The Church is an ancient structure dedicated to All-Saints, and consisting of a nave and aisles, with a chancel, and tower at the west end, and a handsome stained-glass window. The living is a rectory, of which the Duke of Leeds is patron and the Reverend William Alderson, B.A. the incumbent. It is now worth £830 per annum. At Aughton is an Independent Chapel, built by subscription in 1832. Several benefactions for poor parishioners and schooling poor children, amounting to £280, were laid out in the purchase of a house, homestead and 17 acres 19 roods of land, at Ecclesfield, now let for £25 a year, of which £4 is paid to the schoolmaster; £6.10s. given in bread, and £13.10s. in money and clothing to the poor.

The schoolmaster has also £2 a year from the rector, as compensation for a piece of land added to the glebe by the Reverend William Mason, a late rector and celebrated poet, who died here in 1797, and to whose memory there is in the church a marble tablet with a profile bust. During his long residence here, Mason considerably improved the grounds and gardens of the rectory-house, where there still remains on the ceiling of a summer house a medallion containing profiles of himself and his friend Gray.

The late Sir Harry Verelst purchased the manor of Aston of the late Duke of Leeds.

AUGHTON hamlet is only about a quarter of a mile N. of Aston; and 1¹/₂ mile to the E. is Hardwick, where the Darcies, Earls of Holderness, had a seat; and Conduit Common, where there is a spring which formerly supplied Aston Hall with water.
