#### Beware when the Choirs Meet

The Rectory St James the Least of All



My dear Nephew Darren,

You agonised recently over your ecumenical service: who should be invited? Who should preach? What about the order of service? If you had attended our recent combined churches' choir festival, your own dilemmas would have seemed a little less acute. At the pre-meeting, there was heated discussion about whether those choirs who normally wore robes would be comfortable standing among those who didn't. The more aesthetically sensitive worried whether St Agatha's pea green cassocks may clash with our red ones. Intending to be helpful, but phrasing it rather badly, someone suggested that the normally robed choirs should wear nothing. Colonel Wainwright was a little too quick to chuckle.

I began to wonder if a prize was to be awarded to the person who raised the greatest number of concerns: Should the choirs stay separate? Would the tenors be next to the altos or the basses? Where would extra seating be placed? Would the heating be on for the rehearsal? Then came what you would call the 'elephant in the room': of all the choirmasters, who would conduct and who play the organ? Tension mounted, and expressions grew grim. But before the committee started to dig trenches in my carpet and position howitzers under the desk, I briefly left the room, turned off all the electricity and claimed we'd had a power cut. This is a useful device for truculent committees; sadly, it can be used only rarely.

Come the day, an uneasy truce lasted while everyone adopted the traditional solution to disagreement within congregations, and simply did exactly what they wanted. Some were robed, some were not, some choirs congealed in their own huddles, while others joyfully sat next to people from other churches – mainly so they could point out their neighbour's wrong notes. Some sang in the right key, some sang in the wrong key, some sang what sounded like quite different songs altogether.

The service ended with one choir thinking that the organist had played too loudly, while another choir thought that the conductor wasn't up to much. Everyone agreed afterwards that we must do it again, while firmly stating that if their own choirmaster didn't conduct next year, they wouldn't be there.

Thankfully, one fundamental thing on the day united them: they all said that our church was too cold, and they all went down to the pub afterwards to warm up.

#### 6 April - Maundy Thursday : Time to wash feet

Maundy Thursday is famous for two things. The first is one of the final acts that Jesus did before His death: the washing of His own disciples' feet (see John 13). Jesus washed His disciples' feet for a purpose: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another.

In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is 'mandatum novum do vobis'. The word 'mundy' is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command). The ceremony of the 'washing of the feet' of members of the congregation came to be an important part of the liturgy (regular worship) of the medieval church, symbolising the humility of the clergy, in obedience to the example of Christ.

But Thursday was also important because it was on that night that Jesus first introduced the Lord's Supper, or what we nowadays call Holy Communion.

Jesus and His close friends had met in a secret upper room to share the Passover meal together – for the last time. And there Jesus transformed the Passover into the Lord's Supper, saying, 'this is my body' and 'this is my blood' as He, the Lamb of God, prepared to die for the sins of the whole world. John's gospel makes it clear that the Last Supper took place the evening BEFORE the regular Passover meal, and that later Jesus died at the same time that the Passover lambs were killed.



At the Last Supper Jesus shocked His disciples by washing their feet. He did this as an example, to demonstrate to them that they should serve others with humility. Over the centuries, some churches have recreated this act of humility at a special service on Maundy Thursday.

#### 7 April - Good Friday

Good Friday is the day on which Jesus died on the cross. He was crucified at 9 a.m. in the morning, and died six hours later, at 3pm. It is the most solemn day in the Christian year, and is widely marked by the removal of all decorations from churches. In Lutheran churches, the day was marked by the reading of the passion narrative in a gospel, a practice which lies behind the 'passions' composed by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685 – 1750). Both the St Matthew Passion and the St John Passion have their origins in this observance of Good Friday.

The custom of observing a period of three hours' devotion from 12 midday to 3 pm on Good Friday goes back to the 18th century. The 'Three Hours of the Cross' often take the form of an extended meditation on the 'Seven Last Words from the Cross', with periods of silence, prayer, or hymn-singing.

Luke's account of the crucifixion (Luke 23:32-43) emphasises the mocking of the crowd, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself' (35,37,39). In their view a Messiah does not hang on a cross and suffer. In considering the two men who were crucified with Jesus, we are also confronted with the issue of how Jesus secures salvation for us.

The words of one of those crucified with Jesus reflected the crowd's taunts: 'Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us.' He highlights the question of Jesus' identity: how can He save others, when He cannot save Himself from death? He failed to see that the cross itself was the means of salvation.

So - what kind of Messiah was Jesus?

The other criminal's response in his last moments is a moving expression of faith. When challenging the other man, he spoke of the utter injustice of the crucifixion: 'this man has done nothing wrong.' He perceived the truth that Jesus was indeed the Messiah. In a wonderful picture of grace, 'remember me when You come into Your kingdom', the second thief confessed his guilt and secured Jesus' forgiveness and mercy.

In reply, Jesus promised the man life from the moment of death; 'Today you will be with Me in paradise.' Jesus used the picture of a walled garden to help the man understand His promise of protection and security in God's love and acceptance eternally.

Each one of us has to choose how we react to Jesus on the cross. Do we want Him to 'remember' us when He comes into His kingdom, or not? If you were to die tonight, how confident would you be of going to be with Jesus? 'For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God'' (1 Peter 3:18).

#### 9 April - EASTER : The most joyful day of the year

Easter is the most joyful day of the year for Christians. Christ has died for our sins. We are forgiven. Christ has risen! We are redeemed! We can look forward to an eternity in His joy! Hallelujah!

The Good News of Jesus Christ is a message so simple that you can explain it to someone in a few minutes. It is so profound that for the rest of their lives they will still be 'growing' in their Christian walk with God.

Why does the date move around so much? Because the date of Passover moves around, and according to the biblical account, Easter is tied to



the Passover. Passover celebrates the Israelites' exodus from Egypt, and it lasts for seven days, from the middle of the Hebrew month of Nisan, which equates to late March or early April.

Sir Isaac Newton was one of the first to use the Hebrew lunar calendar to come up with firm dates for the first Good Friday: Friday 7th April 30 AD or Friday 3rd April, 33 AD with Easter Day falling two days later. Modern scholars continue to think these two Fridays to be the most likely.

Most people will tell you that Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox, which is broadly true. But the precise calculations are complicated and involve something called an 'ecclesiastical full moon', which is not the same as the moon in the sky. The earliest possible date for Easter in the West is 22ndMarch, which last fell in 1818. The latest is 25th April, which last happened in 1943.

Why the name, 'Easter'? In almost every European language, the festival's name comes from 'Pesach', the Hebrew word for Passover. The Germanic word 'Easter', however, seems to come from Eostre, a Saxon fertility goddess mentioned by the Venerable Bede. He thought that the Saxons worshipped her in 'Eostur month,' but may have confused her with the classical dawn goddesses like Eos and Aurora, whose names mean 'shining in the east'. So, Easter might have meant simply 'beginning month' – a good time for starting up again after a long winter.

Finally, why Easter eggs? On one hand, they are an ancient symbol of birth in most European cultures. On the other hand, hens start laying regularly again each Spring. Since eggs were forbidden during Lent, it's easy to see how decorating and eating them became a practical way to celebrate Easter.

### A Wise Business

'...let us all learn not to think the worse of good instructions even though we receive them from those who do not themselves altogether live up to them.' Martin Manser was commenting upon 'the wisdom of Solomon'. King Solomon, son of King David was famously given great wisdom and penned many proverbs encapsulating it. But he did not always display it in his personal life. He was apparently led astray by his 700 wives and 300 concubines but methinks he was also just a tad culpable himself...(!)

So it is with humility that I share some of the things learned over 35 years of 'doing business' in the hope that this will help others across Rotherham borough make the most of their own endeavours as employees or employers. Taking advice also requires humility, a good first lesson... I was a trainee (2 years) gained a general professional grounding (7 years), become a partner (14 years) started a new business in a different field (12 years and counting). Hopefully this provides useful perspective.

The most important period, after study (unavoidable in one form or another) is gaining a good general grounding. Once you have finished training you can start to really learn. Invest most time and effort in your strengths. If you don't know what they are, ask someone you trust. Do not specialise too soon. A broad working knowledge of something, set in its proper context means you can then learn how to specialise. Otherwise, you can lose sight of the context you are working in and get overtaken by changes and events, finding you and/or your business in a dead end. Learning how to specialise enables you to learn new things move with the times and apply your true strengths.

Share your knowledge freely, without expectation. Going the extra mile makes you and your skill-set far more valuable than your hourly rate. This also applies to working with colleagues and employees. Helping others succeed in the business helps you by developing a virtuous circle. Everyone wins. Look to employ people who are better at what you do than you were when you were at their stage. They may move on but don't fear that. Take it as a compliment. When people do stay your team is however more likely to be being built on genuine loyalty.

Spending quality working time with your people is wise. Listen carefully for pressure points, things which work and things which don't. People like to get things they find difficult out of the way first in any discussion so talk first about Tasks in hand. Listen well and only then advise. Next ask them how the Team is working. Probe. If something is awry deal with it promptly. Finally ask how you can support them as an Individual. Typically, people like good access to training or a higher quality set of 'tools for the job' whatever they might be. Always focus on supporting people's strengths. That is more productive than trying to fix every weakness in their work. You may need someone else to meet that business need...

#### Sir John Melton

In the chancel of All Saints Church, Aston is a brass inscription to Sir John Melton, surmounted by two coats of arms. These were originally attached to his tombstone, which was found embedded in the north aisle wall during restoration work in 1961. On its surface were three recesses, the same shape and size as the brasses. The wording on the brass says:

Of yor charite pray for the soule of Sr John Melton Knyght which decessed the 17 day of July the yere of or lord mdx and the seconde yere of the reigne of king Henry the viii On whose soule thou have mercy amen

This marriage marked the end of the Meltons and the beginning of the Darcys at Aston, who lived here through nine generations until the death of John lord Darcy in 1635. Many of those who fought on the Yorkist side were punished, some severely, but fortunately John kept his life and his estates, possibly because he had married Alice Stanley, a younger daughter of Sir John Stanley. The Stanleys fought on Bosworth Field in support of Henry Tudor.

Sir John died in 1511 and was succeeded by his son John who married Catherine daughter of Sir Hugh Hastings of Fenwick, South Yorkshire. They had no son, just one daughter, Dorothy, born in 1509, who was his heir. Sir John arranged a marriage between Dorothy and George Darcy and the contract was signed at Aston on 26<sup>th</sup> March 1521.

George was the son and heir of Thomas lord Darcy of Temple Newsam, who was beheaded in 1538 by Henry VIII for being involved in the rebellion in the north over the dissolution of the monasteries, called the Pilgrimage of Grace.

George's marriage to Dorothy restored the fortunes of the House of Darcy. She brought with her the manors of Killom, Swine, Aston, Carleton, Owstwick and Hatfield in Yorkshire with 40 messuages, 60 cottages, 4000 acres of arable, 3000 acres of pasture, 2000 acres of moorland, 500 acres of meadow, 100 acres of wood, with properties in Killom, Swine, Aston, Aughton, Hardwick, Waleswood, Brookhouse, Whiston, Carlton, Catwick, Austwick and Hatfield and finally, an acre of land in Hooton Roberts. Later, his title of Lord Darcy was reinstated.

Sir John was born in 1455 and died in 1511. He was the great great great great great grandson of Sir William Melton, nephew and heir to William Melton, Archbishop of York, who bought the Aston Estate and built a new manor house at Aston in 1317. Archbishop William added the chancel and porch to Aston Church. He died in April 1340, a very wealthy man, and was buried in the north aisle of the nave in York Minster.

On his uncle's death, Sir William Melton received a very large inheritance that included the manors of Aston, Kilham, Owstwick and Towton and land in North Milford and Sherburn, all in Yorkshire. Also properties in Nottinghamshire and Hampshire. He later acquired estates in Cotness, Fenton, Wilton, Whiston, Laughton and other parts of Yorkshire.

The Meltons lived at Aston through several generations and they were prominent in the county, serving as High Sheriffs of Yorkshire, Members of Parliament and marrying well.

During the Wars of the Roses, fought between 1455 and 1485, the Meltons supported Richard III and Sir John Melton fought at the Battle of Bosworth Field on 22<sup>nd</sup> August 1485 when King Richard III was killed and Henry Tudor, Earl of Richmond, became King Henry VII. This battle marked the end of the Wars of the Roses, apart from a few skirmishes. John is said to have laid the first stone of the chapel in Towton that Richard III intended to build commemorating the dead of the battle of Towton.
