4th June : Trinity Sunday, celebrating our God who is Three Persons



Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are of the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

Deuteronomy 6:4: ‘Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.’

Isaiah 45:22: ‘Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.’

Genesis 1:1-2: ‘In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...’

Judges 14:6: ‘The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...’

John 1:1-3: ‘In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.’

Luke 24:49 manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: ‘I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.’

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that warmth and life are there as well.



9th June : Columba of Iona, missionary to the UK

In 563 AD St Columba sailed from Ireland to Iona – a tiny island off Mull, in the Western Highlands. He brought Christianity with him.

Columba (c. 521 -97) was born in Donegal of the royal Ui Neill clan, and he trained as a monk. He founded the monasteries of Derry (546), Durrow (c.556) and probably Kells. But in 565 Columba left Ireland with twelve companions for Iona, an island off southwest Scotland. Iona had been given to him for a monastery by the ruler of the Irish Dalriada.

Why would a monk in his mid-40s go into such voluntary exile? Various explanations include going into voluntary exile for Christ, an attempt to help overseas compatriots in their struggle for survival, or even as some sort of punishment for his part in a row over a psalter in Ireland. Whatever the reason, Columba went to Iona and spent the rest of his life in Scotland, returning to Ireland only for occasional visits.

Columba's biographer, Adomnan, portrays him as a tall, striking figure of powerful build and impressive presence, who combined the skills of scholar, poet and ruler with a fearless commitment to God's cause. Able, ardent, and sometimes harsh, Columba seems to have mellowed with age.

As well as building his monastery on Iona, Columba also converted Brude, king of the Picts. Columba had great skill as a scribe, and an example of this can be seen in the Cathach of Columba, a late 6th century psalter in the Irish Academy, which is the oldest surviving example of Irish majuscule writing. In his later years Columba spent much time transcribing books.

Columba's death was apparently foreseen by his community, and even, it seems, sensed by his favourite horse. He died in the church just before Matins, and it is a tribute to this man that his traditions were upheld by his followers for about a century, not least in the Synod of Whitby and in Irish monasteries on the continent of Europe.

Here is a prayer of St Columba:

Christ With Us
My dearest Lord,
Be Thou a bright flame before me,
Be Thou a guiding star above me,
Be Thou a smooth path beneath me,
Be Thou a kindly shepherd behind me,
Today and evermore.





22nd June : St Alban, Britain's first Christian martyr

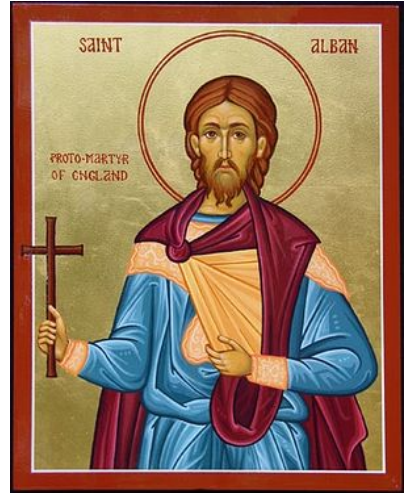
Alban was the very first Christian martyr in Britain – or at least the first we know of. A 'martyr' is someone who has died for the faith – the word literally means 'witness'. He was probably killed during the persecution under the emperor Diocletian in the early years of the fourth century, in the late stages of the Roman occupation of Britain. His martyrdom took place in the amphitheatre outside the Roman city of Verulamium, which is now St Albans, in Hertfordshire.

The church historian Bede, writing 600 years after Alban's death, records that Alban was a Roman citizen (possibly a soldier) who gave shelter to a priest who was being hunted by the Romans. During the priest's stay in his home, Alban was converted to the Christian faith. When the soldiers eventually tracked the priest down, they arrived at Alban's house and insisted on searching it. What they found was Alban dressed in the priest's clothes, while their real prey escaped. They arrested Alban and demanded that he make a sacrifice to the Emperor – a common test of loyalty. He refused. He was then condemned to death and taken into the amphitheatre, which still stands in the fields below St Alban's Abbey, to be put to death. One of his executioners was converted, Bede claims, but the other one took a sword and beheaded him.

He was buried nearby, on a site where a shrine was later erected. In the early fifth century two Continental bishops, Germanus of Auxerre and Lupus of Troyes, were sent to Britain and record that they visited the shrine of Alban at Verulamium. The date of their visit was given as 429.

The martyrdom of Alban is a reminder that Christianity was planted first in these islands during the Roman occupation, though it was all but extinguished in England in the dark centuries that followed, until people like David, Cuthbert and the other Celtic missionaries restored the faith in many parts of the land – especially in the north. The fact that his shrine existed and was venerated right through to the time of Bede also demonstrates that the faith did not die out completely, even in the south of England.

Not a great deal is known about Alban apart from the story of his martyrdom, but what we do know is probably enough to give him a substantial claim to be the patron saint of England ahead of the foreigner St George.





‘But, I do all of that myself...’

Many of us have experience of older relatives who have found it hard to admit the need for support. Nobody wants to lose their independence and as for Rotherham folk perhaps they value it more than most! Memory issues can reduce a person’s insight into their abilities so, it often falls on family members to recognize and act upon the signs that a parent might need help with daily tasks. Taking action early and planning ahead usually just involves putting in place some companionship based support at home. Here are a few questions which might help us check out the need for some extra care:

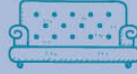
- * Are your parents able to take care of themselves? Pay good attention to your parents’ appearance. Failure to keep up with daily routines such as bathing, brushing teeth, and good hygiene is a sign that they may be experiencing feelings of depression or have a physical ailment or limitation.
- * Are your parents able to take care of their home? Are the lights working or is the laundry piling up? Is the garden becoming overgrown? Are there any changes in the way your parents do things around the house could provide clues to their health?
- * Are your parents safe on the road? Driving can be challenging for older adults. If your parents become confused while driving or you’re concerned about their ability to drive safely, it might possibly be time to stop driving. Look out for unexplained dents in the car. But this issue has to be tackled very sensitively and sensibly. They may just need new glasses!
- * Have your parents lost weight? Losing weight without trying could be a sign that something is wrong. Weight loss could be related to many factors. It might be nothing medically serious although a GP health check can do no harm. Reasons can include difficulty cooking, loss of taste or smell or perhaps it is the signal of an underlying condition such as malnutrition, dementia, or depression.
- * Are your parents still social? It’s important to talk to your parents about their activities. Are they connecting with friends? Have they maintained interest in hobbies and other daily activities? Are they involved in organizations or clubs? If a parent gives up on being with others, it could be a sign of a problem.

Even if you don’t live near-by to your parents but are concerned about their health and wellbeing, there are many things you can do to ensure your parents’ are getting the support they need. Share your concerns with them and address any issues that you feel may become bigger if they aren’t dealt with early on. Encourage regular medical check-ups, consider home care services, and seek help from local agencies such as a GP or Alzheimer’s Society if there are memory related issues. 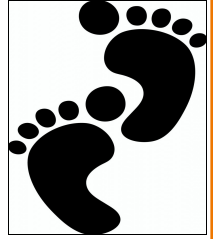

LOCAL CLUBS AND SOCIETIES IN ASTON TERRACE AND FENCE



Aston Terrace Miner's Welfare Bowling Club

ASTON TERRACE

Aston Terrace Miners' Welfare Tennis Club

The annual meeting of this Club was held on 26th April 1934 and the following officials were elected: Secretary and President Mr L Short, 78 Aston Terrace, Swallownest; Committee, Messrs. A Johnson, F Marlow, T Bottomley and S Wright, Mesdames Marlow, J Steedman and M Harrison.

Aston Colliery Football Club

Under the auspices of this Club, a whist drive and dance was held in the Council School, Swallownest on Friday 29th February 1924. Attractive prizes were offered for the whist and seventeen tables were occupied for the drive.

Aston Terrace Miners' Welfare Bowling Club

The annual general meeting of this Bowling Club was held in the Institute on the 24th April 1934. It was decided to join the Sheffield and Hallamshire Division III Section "A".

Aston Miners' Mutual Benefit Society

In July 1869 the fifth anniversary meeting in connection with the above society was held. The members, headed by the Aston Brass Band proceeded to the Swallownest Methodist Chapel. They then sat down to a substantial dinner, prepared by Mr Thomas Wilson, of the Blue Bell Inn, Aston, at whose house the society's meetings are held.

Aston Terrace Health and Strength Club

The club recommenced their winter session with their capable secretary, manager and instructor, Mr Bern Atherton, who is very proud of the club which he formed about three years ago (1933). The club is now affiliated to the British Amateur Weight Lifter's association. The entrance fee is 1s. And the weekly subscription 3d.



FENCE

Fence Pig Club

This is Fence Pig Club on an outing to visit the premises of British Oil and Cake Mills in Hull. (1940s). I cannot find any more information about this club but it was probably one of the many government introduced pig clubs during the Second World War years of food rationing. The Small Pig Keeper's Council (SPKC) was the national governing body that gave advice and rules on how groups and individuals could raise pigs. Pig club members would buy a pig, and provide food waste for the pigs to eat, care for them and ultimately share the meat that was produced. Every pig had to be registered with the SPKC, and the authorities tracked and controlled what happened to the meat. Club members could keep half for themselves; the other half would be handed over to the Ministry of Food.

Fence Playing Field Fund

At the annual meeting of the Fence Playing Field Fund held on 4th May 1934, the following officials were elected: Chairman, Mr C Clayton, Treasurer Mr P A Butland, Secretary Mr W H Hoult.

Fence Wesleyan Church Tennis Club

Fence Wesleyan Church members have formed a tennis club. (June 1932). The following officers were elected: President, Mr C Clayton, secretary, Mr J Thompson, Falconer Lane, Fence; treasurer, Mr S Thompson; committee, Messrs R Edgley, H Raynor, W Taylor, G Liversidge and Miss D Hallford.

Fence Junior Football Club

In August 1935, Fence Junior Football Club has been formed with a membership of twenty. Persons wishing to join are cordially invited. The first practice match will be held on Saturday 10th August 1935, kick-off 3 p.m. on the club's official ground in Mr J Siddall's plantation field. In May 1937 they held their annual presentation night and supper at the Fence Council School. They have succeeded in winning the Worksop Junior League and the Sheffield Junior League. They were only formed two seasons ago and the club are very proud of their success.



Fence Touring Club

Mr. J. Broughton presided at the first general meeting of the Fence Touring Club held in the Tourist Hut, Fence, yesterday (27th March 1932). Mr T Catherall was the leader of the Touring Club on Sunday 19th June 1932 when nine members had an enjoyable run to Matlock. Tomorrow the run is to Newark.

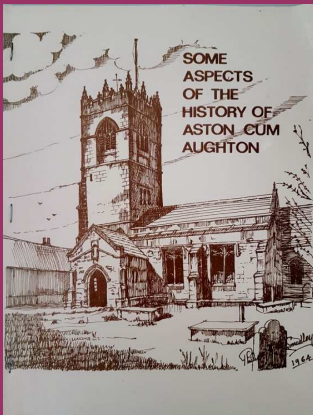
Fence Playing Fields Association

There was a record attendance at the general meeting of this association on Monday 22nd April 1935 in Fence Council School. It was decided to open the new playing fields on Saturday 11 May. The opening ceremony is to be performed by Alderman E Dunn, Maltby, supported by members of Aston Parish Council and school managers. A children's parade will be held before the opening as well as the crowning of a May Queen. There will be sideshows, stalls etc. on the field.

Fence Dramatic Society

To aid the funds of the Playing Fields' Association, this newly formed Society presented two sketches, entitled "Henpecked" and "The Man with the Camera" in the Fence Council School on Easter Tuesday evening. There was a good audience. It was their first effort and proved very successful.

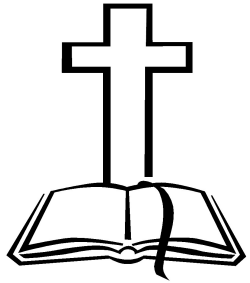

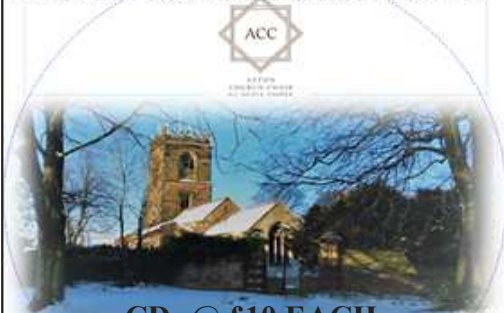

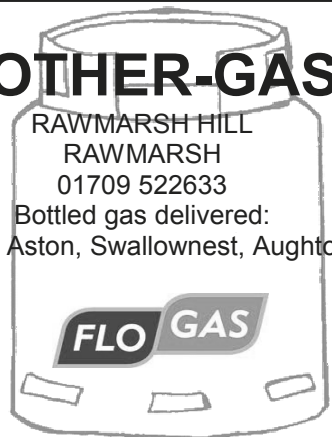
