### On why Carol Services are so Dangerous

My dear nephew Darren,



So, you are excited about being invited to plan your first Carol Service. The dangers involved are only slightly less than being invited to judge the best cake made by the Ladies' Group. You seem to have no idea of the lifelong offence you will inevitably cause. In decades to come when you will either be a seasoned old clergyman – or more likely a double glazing salesman – you will be remembered as "the Curate who offended Mrs Smith."

First, you have to decide which groups are going to be represented to give the readings. If the Brownies were asked last year, then it has to be the Cubs this time. But don't forget that every third year, the Boys' Brigade must be asked, or they will take their revenge and get their flag tangled in the nave chandelier come Remembrance Sunday. If someone represents the choir, then over a four year period, all four voice parts must be called on – and if the organist isn't asked on the fifth year, then all hymns subsequently will be played at double speed and with one verse missing. Should one person have been invited to read for two successive years, then their annual appearance thereafter will be taken as an inalienable right for the rest of their lifetime – and probably longer than that. To drop them may well invoke legal proceedings,

Then there is the batting order to be considered. Someone from the church council will take it as a deliberate slight if they are placed lower in the order than a representative of the Men's Fellowship and no self-respecting bell ringer would voluntarily follow a brass cleaner.

If you do not specify where they should read from and how the readings should end, then a form of ecclesiastical inflation will happen. If the first reader speaks from the chancel step, the next one will go to the lectern; after the sanctuary and pulpit have been utilised, the final reader will probably ask you to move so he can take your place. The variations on "Here endeth", "This is the Word of the Lord", and "Thanks be to God", are endless and will increase in length as the Service progresses. The final reader will probably end with a lengthy exegesis on what he thinks the passage means, correcting whatever you said in your sermon.

I once made the mistake of not telling all readers which Bible translation to use. One, an Old Testament expert, therefore decided to read in Hebrew. Not to be outdone, another read her Gospel passage in Greek – apologising beforehand that it may not be a perfect rendering, as she was spontaneously translating it from the English. And some say Christians are not competitive.

You have two alternatives: either repeat last year's Service without any alteration, saying that it could not be improved, or design your own – and then take Christmas off.

# "GOD BLESS US, EVERY ONE!" MERRY CHRISTMAS

### 25th December : Christingle a Generous Gift from the Moravians



It is the Moravians whom we have to thank for bringing us the Christingle. Especially one Moravian clergyman: John de Watteville.

On 20th December, 1747, John de Watteville was taking a children's service in his Moravian church in Marienborn, Germany. He led the children in some hymns, and read out verses which the children themselves had written to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Then he explained to the children that true happiness only comes through knowing Jesus. Jesus, said John de Watteville, "has kindled in each little heart a flame which keeps burning to their joy and our happiness".

John de Watteville then went on to illustrate that 'flame'. He gave each child a little lighted wax candle, tied around with a red ribbon. He ended his service with a little prayer: "Lord Jesus, kindle a flame in these children's hearts, that theirs like Thine become".

The visual aid was a great success with the children; for the Marienborn Diary for that day concludes: "hereupon the children went full of joy with their lighted candles to their rooms and so went glad and happy to bed".

The candle and red ribbon were remembered the following year, and the following after that.... The years came and went, and as the Moravians began to travel beyond Germany, so they took the custom with them: to Labrador, to Pennsylvania, to Tibet and Suriname, to the Caribbean and South Africa. In each country the Christians adapted it for their own use.

No one knows for certain when the word 'Christingle' was first used with regard to the custom. No one even knows where the word 'Christingle' comes from. Some people say it is from the old Saxon word 'ingle' (fire), meaning 'Christ-fire or light'. Another theory is that it derives from the German 'engel' (angel), meaning 'Christ-angel'.

In any event, the symbolism of Christingle gradually developed, until today the Moravians in the British Province use an orange, representing the world, with a lighted candle to represent Christ, the Light of the World. Nuts, raisins and sweets on cocktail sticks around the candle represent God's bounty and goodness in providing the fruits of the earth. Red paper, forming a frill around the base of the candle, reminds us of the blood of Christ shed for all people on the cross at Calvary.

In Moravian churches, the Christingle Service is usually held on the Sunday before Christmas or on Christmas Eve. The website for the Moravian Church says: "We are glad that the Moravian Church has been able to make this contribution to the wider Christian world."

### 25th December : The man who married Mary

The traditional Nativity scene on our Christmas cards has Mary with the Holy Babe. Around her are the shepherds and Magi. We may also see stable animals, angels and a star! While Joseph is often included, his presence seems to be of minor importance. After all, we praise God for Jesus with our familiar Christmas carols, mentioning angels, shepherds, Wise men and Mary but the name of Joseph is absent! Why is Joseph given a low profile? For he is a man to be remembered.



Joseph was a resident of Nazareth. He worked as a carpenter and his skills would have included making furniture, repairing buildings and crafting agricultural tools. Although Joseph had an honourable profession, he would not have been a man of great wealth.

The gospel writers Matthew and Luke give Joseph a few brief mentions. After the birth of Jesus, Joseph and Mary go to the temple in Jerusalem to dedicate the Baby to God. Afterwards, they flee into Egypt to escape the wrath of Herod and much later return to Nazareth. Twelve years later, Mary and Joseph go with Jesus to Jerusalem for the Passover feast. Here they lose Jesus, and find Him in the Temple talking with religious leaders!

Apart from these verses, the New Testament is silent about the rest of Joseph's life. However, we do know that Joseph was father to other children by Mary. His four sons are named and they had at least two daughters. (See Matthew 13:55)

And we also know that Joseph was someone who quietly and humbly took on the awesome role in caring for the early life of the Son of God. Joseph would have taught Jesus many things – not just the skills of a labourer, but the lore of the countryside which was evident in our Lord's teaching. Jesus grew up within a loving family and described God as 'Father', knowing also the good fatherly qualities of Joseph.

In the Christmas story, Joseph is placed into a situation that brought him misunderstanding and suspicion. But Joseph remained faithful in the knowledge that as long as God had spoken, the opinion of others mattered little. Before Jesus began His ministry it is believed that Joseph died. It is likely Jesus took on many of His father's responsibilities before He left home.

In the eyes of the world, Joseph was a nobody. He was not a man of valour, fame and fortune. But he was the one who had parental responsibility for the greatest person who has ever lived!

It is sad that we often equate ordinariness with ineffectiveness. Down the ages, God has used many ordinary people to accomplish great things. God continues to use ordinary people. Like Joseph, we need to know that doing God's will is the most important thing in life. May we, this Christmas, respond to God's call to us and please Him in all that we

### THE FAMILIES WHO HELD THE MANOR OF ASTON FROM 1066 - 1948

From the time of the Conquest until 1928 Aston was largely owned by four knightly or gentry families who had possession over many generations; the de Warennes from 1066, the Meltons from 1332, the Darcys from 1521 and the Verelsts from 1774. Then from 1928 - 1948 the Matthews. Beginning with the de Warennes I will include an article each month about each of these families.

THE DARCYS Part 2

George and Dorothy's one surviving son John became 2<sup>nd</sup> Baron D'Arcy of Aston, known as Lord D'Arcy of the North. He married Agnes, daughter of Thomas Babington of Dethick in Derbyshire and they had one child, a son Michael. John lived in Aston during the long reign of Elizabeth I and was not as active in service as his father and grandfather. In 1569 he was governor of Doncaster during the rebellion of two northern earls and went with the Earl of Essex to Ireland in 1573 in his expedition against the rebels in Ulster. Most of the time he lived quietly at Aston and is said to have received "with much joy and comfort", letters from the Queen. He died in 1602 and his burial is recorded in the parish register of Aston but we can find no monument erected to his memory.

On 30th January 1576 in Aston Church, his son Michael married Margaret, daughter of Thomas Wentworth of Wentworth Woodhouse. They had a son John and two daughters Anne and Margaret. Michael died before his father and his son John inherited from his grandfather. A brass memorial to Michael and his wife was installed in the old church in Wentworth. In May 2014 this memorial was stolen, along with two other memorials to the Wentworth family.

John D'Arcy, 3rd Baron D'Arcy of Aston was born around 1579. He enjoyed his estate at Aston for more than 32 years. He never involved himself with the public affairs of his time and his life was spent at Aston where he lived "diffusing happiness and a religious spirit around him". He was known as "Good Lord D'Arcy". He married four times

His first wife was Rosamond Frescheville daughter of Peter Frescheville, of Staveley. They had three children, John, Rosamond and Elizabeth. John was born in 1602, Rosamond in 1605 and Elizabeth in 1606. Their mother died in 1607. John became Member of Parliament for Retford but died in April 1624, aged 22, and his sister Elizabeth died two months later in June. Rosamund was to have married Lord Brooke and in 1628 all the marriage arrangements had been made when she died.

In 1617 John married for the second time. Isabel was the daughter of Sir Christopher Wray, of Glentworth, in Lincolnshire, a Chief Justice of the Queen's Bench. They had no children and she died in 1622.

Two years later, John married for the third time. On the 7<sup>th</sup> November 1624 in Harthill Church, he married 18 years old Honourable Mary Belasyse, 2nd daughter of Thomas Belasyse, 1st Viscount Fauconberg. Mary was a sister of Lady Osborne of Kiveton Hall. She died 14<sup>th</sup> September 1625, shortly after giving birth to a son, who died in early infancy. She was buried at Aston.

He married for a fourth time, his third cousin Elizabeth West, sister and coheiress of John West of Firbeck Hall and first daughter of William West of Firbeck and his wife Katherine D'Arcy. Katherine was the first daughter of Sir Edward D'Arcy MP of Dartford Place, Kent and his wife Elizabeth Asteley, daughter of Thomas Asteley, third son of Hon. Arthur D'Arcy, Lieutenant of the Tower of London. They had no children and John died 5th July 1635, leaving no heir. On his death the Barony of D'Arcy of Aston became extinct. The estate at Aston then reverted to another line of the D'Arcy Family, to a descendant of Thomas D'Arcy's second son, Sir Arthur D'Arcy.
